(At about 10:20 a.m. - Court in session, in the presence of the Stephen Turner jury)

THE COURT: Mr. Bramble, you may address Mr. Stephen Turner's jury.

MR. BRAMBLE: Thank you, your Honor, and I apologize to you and the jury. I had to make sure my witnesses were here and in fact ready to go.

Ladies and gentlemen of the jury, I just ran up a couple flights of stairs, so I will catch my breath in a moment here.

This is my opportunity to tell you the witnesses I will call and what facts I will produce on the elements of the offense that the judge will instruct you upon.

Now, this defendant, Stephen Turner, is charged with one count of first degree criminal sexual conduct. He's charged as an aider and abetter in that count. In other words, he helped or assisted his brother.

The second count is criminal sexual

conduct in the second degree, and that is that he himself touched the prescribed areas of Lakeysha Cage.

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Now, the testimony that's going to come forward, the first witness I'm going to call, and I wanted to make sure she was in fact here, is in fact Lakeysha Cage. She is a ten-year-old little girl. She will tell you that she in fact lived over at 4130 Oak Park at the time. It's an area right near where the Kentwood and Grand Rapids borders meet. It's an apartment complex.

She will testify that on this particular date, July 7th, 1993, that she's out playing.

She's out playing on the steps near the apartment of this man or his brother, and that on that day she was in fact playing with some rubber bands and she's playing with some sticks, and I think she'll testify that she's trying to make something out of these things. They're sticks and she's trying to make a boat or a car or something.

She will testify that while she's playing, the defendant's brother, Daniel Turner, comes and grabs her. He takes her into their apartment. This is Apartment 204 at 4139 Oak Park. He takes her in there, brings her to the

back bedroom, this is Daniel Turner, and begins to undress her, and does in fact undress her.

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She will testify that Daniel Turner is the one wearing the lipstick. As a matter of fact, that's how he's first identified. She'll testify, "The man with the lipstick on touched me."

She will testify that during this time he's touching her, he's trying to climb on top of her. That he in fact at one time puts his mouth on her vagina, another time engages in oral sex, and during one of these occasions the defendant is assisting, he's helping out, he's holding on to her.

She'll further testify that on another occasion the defendant is feeling her chest.

She will also testify to some other things that came out a little bit during voir dire. She'll testify that Daniel Turner during this time, Daniel Turner, made her try on some clothing, some articles of clothing and that he himself had on some articles of clothing, female clothing, women's clothing. They're bras and padded bras, and he's having her try them on. I think she'll be able to identify these things.

She'll further testify that during this occasion she asked to leave and tells about how her mother's home, and that in fact Daniel Turner won't let her leave, tells her he doesn't care if her mother's home, things of this nature.

She's also threatened at the end, by the time this is all done. She's threatened if she tells someone they're going to kill her, or he's going to kill her.

Now, Lakeysha will also testify to some other things in the apartment. Besides the women's paraphernalia and the clothing, and so on and so forth, she's going to testify that Daniel Turner sets her down on his lap and has her play a video game, and the video game is a video strip poker.

She in fact plays it, and during this time Daniel Turner is also touching her and touching her chest, and things of this nature.

Now, what is the woman's clothing, what is the video strip poker, what is the fact that she's playing with sticks and rubber bands have to do, what pieces of evidence, what are they in this whole scheme?

I submit if you look, you will see

photographs and other evidence that -- one of the first photographs I'm going to show Lakeysha is the fact that -- you will see that evidence technicians came and took photographs and actually found the sticks, twigs, whatever, that Lakeysha was playing with, and rubber bands, as well, and weren't taken into the apartment with her as if this was some willing excursion into the apartment, but they remained right where Lakeysha was grabbed.

They remained on the steps, and they're in the photographs and you will see those photographs.

Lakeysha will tell you about the video strip poker, and, in fact, items were seized from the apartment regarding this, computer disks and television, and you will see pictures of all this.

And, in fact, going through this, there is a video strip poker game and they were able to access the computer disk, and it's there and it's on the disk, and you will actually see a little bit of it being played. It's actually videotaped instead of bringing all the video equipment in here. That is there.

Lakeysha Cage will also testify that
this man with the lipstick on and the defendant
were together in the room, and actually took a
knife out and actually had some jelly, and made
her take this knife and actually put it to this
defendant's neck and pretending like they were
going to take a photograph of this, and told her
that, "If you go to the police, we're going to
show them this photograph, and we're going to tell
them you were in here and you did this, and you
were threatening him."

And again, you're dealing with a ten-year-old girl here. How that is important is that some of the items of clothing are seized, including Lakeysha Cage's, and, in fact, there's going to be testimony from some Michigan State Police Crime Lab technicians that that lipstick stain is found.

And, as a matter of fact, Dr. Steven

Perry will testify that, in his notes, he sees the

lipstick stain. He sees it on the shirt. The

shirt is also analyzed for the possibility of

there being jelly on there.

Lakeysha is going to say they take something like strawberry or red-colored jelly and

put it on a knife and make it look like blood, and, in fact, there's a stain on her shirt that's consistent with jelly, and you will hear testimony regarding that.

Lakeysha Cage is brought from the scene, and after she talks to a couple people,

Officer Mesman, Officer Baar -- and you will find out there's a lot of commotion going on at this time, a great deal of commotion.

Some things are asked of Lakeysha.

Later some other things are asked of her, and I
think you will get the picture that instead of
having leading questions asked of her, she's
allowed to sit down and tell the story and tell
what happened, and describe the entire incident to
Detective Vazquez.

Out, and it's her telling the story and it's not an officer asking a question during, right during the incident where the mother has confronted Daniel Turner, where the father is there, where the police are there.

Dr. Perry will testify that Lakeysha does come in to St. Mary's Hospital. The nurse will testify again as to statements taken pursuant

to medical treatment and diagnosis, and Lakeysha tells her again that, in fact, the defendant Daniel Turner grabs her, takes her to the apartment, puts his mouth on her vagina, makes him -- or makes her, allows her to place his penis in her mouth.

And she will testify as to what they told her, what Daniel Turner told her why she couldn't tell.

Dr. Perry will also testify that

Lakeysha, when they were attempting -
Mrs. Marble, Lakeysha's mom, will testify that
they wanted to do an examination, physical
examination of her vaginal area, and this
examination could not be done because Lakeysha at
that time was either so upset, or just the actual
doing of it caused in fact pain. She wouldn't
allow it to be done.

The doctor told her, told her mother that there are basically two options: "You can hold her down and we can have people hold her down and we can conduct the examination, pelvic examination that way, or we can anesthetize her and put her under and do it that way."

Mrs. Marble will testify she chose to do

neither. She wasn't going to have her daughter traumatized anymore.

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So an examination wasn't done at that time. However, later on, again, some two weeks later she's examined again, and she's examined at the Child Assessment Center. At that time another medical history is taken, and again you will hear testimony regarding that statement, again being that the defendant, Daniel Turner, grabs — he takes her into the room, takes her into the apartment, and the acts are described that were perpetrated.

You will hear testimony from Dr. Cox.

He takes a history, and again, this is some two
weeks later, and does an examination, although you
will hear testimony that at one time Lakeysha
mentions something about the defendant either
trying to or penetrating her with his penis.

She's never told anyone else that, and the doctor will testify there are no physical findings in her vaginal area. But I submit to you, we charged him with two counts, one involving the mouth to her vagina and the second involving the defendant placing his penis in her mouth.

MS. KRAUSE: For the record,

Mr. Prosecutor, which defendant?

MR. BRAMBLE: Excuse me, Daniel Turner, I'm sorry.

MR. BRAMBLE: I have to give two opening statements here, and if I'm confused or provide information on one defendant as to the other, again, you're here to try and to decide only the allegations involving Stephen Turner.

And the allegations are, as I said, that he assisted, he helped in some way, however small, his brother in this matter in the first degree criminal sexual conduct and the second degree criminal sexual conduct we allege he actually perpetrated. He was the one doing the touching.

And when you look at Lakeysha's testimony and what she tells you, you will find that when a search warrant is conducted of the residence of Apartment 204, the things she described being there, the video disks, the video games, the women's clothing, all that is present.

I submit when the facts come out, the evidence is going to indicate this defendant was involved, although at the scene the defendant tells you that in fact, oh, yes, he'd been there all day, but he'd been sleeping all the time.

You're also going to hear some testimony about a statement taken later that's going to directly contradict that.

I submit to you that when all is done here, you're going to find out that the defendant never told the truth the first time when he was allowed to give a statement, and he never told the truth --

MS. KRAUSE: Okay, your Honor, that's argument. The prosecutor is allowed to tell what he thinks he can prove, not to draw conclusions therefrom.

THE COURT: I think saying that a statement was untrue is a statement of supposed facts, and you may proceed, Mr. Bramble.

MR. BRAMBLE: Thank you, your Honor.

Two statements: One, "I was there all the time, but I was sleeping." The next one will be directly contradictory to that.

The facts will indicate the defendant is guilty of first degree criminal sexual conduct in assisting his brother in the acts described. The facts will also indicate that he engaged in some touching, he engaged in some fondling of Lakeysha Cage.

When the facts all come out, they will reflect that the defendant is guilty of all those charges.

On behalf of Lakeysha Cage, on behalf of the People of the State of Michigan, I'll ask that your verdict reflect that, as well.

THE COURT: Miss Krause?

MS. KRAUSE: Thank you, your Honor.

Good morning, ladies and gentlemen. I'm glad you got the soft seats this morning.

The prosecutor has thrown out a big fishnet here, and the purpose of the fishnet is to catch the fish here, the people who he alleges committed these awful, terrible, horrible things against Lakeysha Cage.

Seemingly, two fish have been caught.

Now, one of those fish might be a keeper, but I submit to you that the other fish is one that you must practice the theory of catching the keeper.

You might keep Dan Turner, but you've got to throw Stephen Turner back into the water.

As I tell you now what I expect the evidence to be in this case, I want you to remember three key phrases. No assistance, no act, and no alignment. Let me repeat those. No

assistance, no act, and no alignment.

Let me tell you what I mean by those phrases.

First of all, no assistance. You've heard a lot of talk about the fact that my client, Stephen Turner, is charged with aiding and abetting his brother Daniel Turner in committing an act of criminal sexual conduct in the first degree.

That means, to establish that, the prosecutor must show, first of all, that Daniel Turner actually committed an act of CSC First. I don't think the evidence will show you that he has, but we'll get back to that in a minute.

He has to show that in some way Stephen Turner assisted his brother in doing that, and that if he did an act of assistance, he had to intend it to be an act of assistance.

Now, let's assume just for a moment that you believe Daniel Turner committed an act of CSC First. When I say "CSC," forgive me, that means criminal sexual conduct. There is going to be no evidence presented to you in this case that shows Stephen Turner did anything to assist his brother.

Lakeysha will tell you that she's outside playing in front of her apartment with some sticks and rubber bands, and while she's doing that, a man with lipstick, red lipstick, comes up to her, grabs her. She will tell you that it was a man with red lipstick and she will say that it was Daniel Turner, not my client, Stephen.

She will tell you that she's dragged into the apartment from one end of the apartment all the way to the back by the man with red lipstick, Daniel Turner, not my client, Stephen.

She will tell you that once she's in the back bedroom, the man with red lipstick undresses her, undresses himself, gets on top of her, and fondles her.

There may be some testimony of oral sex performed on Lakeysha and Lakeysha on Dan, and there may be some talk about the defendant Daniel Turner ejaculating in the back bedroom. But again, she will identify this as being done by Daniel Turner, not my client, Stephen.

She will tell you Dan was in the room.

My client, Stephen, was not. In fact, Lakeysha is going to tell you that at some point my client,

Stephen, walks into the room, the back bedroom.

When he does, Daniel Turner asks him to help him hold Lakeysha down, and Lakeysha is going to tell you that my client, Stephen, refused. He said no.

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You're going to hear then that Lakeysha is taken back out into the living room. While in the living room the defendant Daniel Turner has her play computer games. You will hear that it was Dan, not my client, Stephen.

You will hear Lakeysha tell you that at some point my client, Stephen, left the apartment all together. At some point, according to Lakeysha, after Stephen leaves the apartment there is more sexual assaults performed on her by the defendant Daniel Turner, not my client, Stephen.

That leaves one possible thing the prosecutor can try to show you as an act of assistance by Stephen Turner to help his brother Dan commit this criminal sexual conduct in the first degree. That's the photograph.

Lakeysha is going to tell you that the brothers, both Dan and Steve, staged a photograph, where she was to hold a knife with peanut butter on it up to my client, Stephen Turner. That Dan took a picture of it. Her impression or her

understanding, she'll tell you, of why this was done was so that the police wouldn't believe her if she said anything. There is no photograph.

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Okay, that takes us to the second thing I asked you to keep in mind, no act.

Stephen is charged with committing the substantive offense of criminal sexual conduct in the second degree. For purposes of this opening, inappropriate sexual touching.

You will hear Lakeysha say -- let me back up a second.

You heard in Mr. Bramble's opening that most everything focuses on the defendant Daniel Turner. Most of the acts that you will hear described, most of the testimony from Lakeysha is going to center on Daniel Turner.

What she says about Stephen is limited, and remember back to what I just said about the times he's not in the room, not in the apartment, and it's an act she specifically says he does not do. But this act of sexual touching is supposed to have occurred somewhere in the middle of all this.

Lakeysha is going to tell you that Stephen grabbed her and took her out of the

bedroom, took her out to the living room, dragging her the whole way. It's unclear at this point, and I'm not sure which way she's going to say it, whether he was fondling her breasts as he dragged her or whether once he got her to the living room he fondled her breasts at that point.

But I submit to you that as you listen to the evidence that's presented, you're going to be left with the impression that it just doesn't make sense, given all of her other testimony.

That it wouldn't have happened by Stephen Turner and it wouldn't have happened the way she described it.

That takes us to the final thing we asked you to remember, no alignment. No, I'm not talking about going to your chiropractor. What I'm talking about is does the physical, scientific evidence line up with what Lakeysha is telling us. That's what I mean by "alignment," and I think as you listen to the evidence, ladies and gentlemen, you will see for yourselves that it does not. There is no alignment.

She describes being ejaculated on, but yet there's no physical evidence from a Woods light. You heard testimony that that's a

fluorescent lamp that medical personnel use to determine if there's the presence of semen. So that scientific fact does not line up with her testimony.

The photograph that she describes. There is no photograph. That doesn't line up.

She will give you much testimony about being dragged and grabbed and carried. There's no physical evidence to support that, no bruises, no scrapes, no abrasions, no trauma to her external body.

There are other things that you will hear about that as we go through the case, and I will argue them in my closing argument. But you will see -- and listen carefully, because the scientific medical evidence, and you will be presented with much of it from doctors, nurses, lab technicians, police officers, does not fit into alignment with her testimony.

I'm confident if you keep those three things in mind as you listen to all the evidence that's presented in this case, no assistance, no act, and no alignment, you will be convinced at the end of this trial that you should return a verdict of not guilty against Stephen Turner for

aiding and abetting the commission of criminal sexual conduct in the first degree against Lakeysha Cage, and a verdict of not guilty for criminal sexual conduct in the second degree.

Thank you.

THE COURT: Ladies and gentlemen, I asked the other jury to be back at eleven. We have fifteen minutes to spare, so why don't you go back to your jury room.

We'll check to make sure they're all here, and when we have everyone, we'll come on in I hope right at 11:00 and be able to start the proofs, and in the next fifteen minutes I can take care of a few administrative things here, anyway, that will help things move along.

I'll show you out and then counsel will take care of those matters.

(At about 10:45 a.m. - The Stephen Turner jury left the courtroom)

THE COURT: We're back in session with Mr. Stephen Turner's case where the Court can put on the record a ruling -- this Court is now convened in Mr. Stephen Turner's case for purposes of putting on the record a ruling which was made at the bench during the course of voir dire.

Three of the jurors placed in the jury box in the course of the voir dire, Miss Bartlett, Mr. Nelson, and Mr. Kaminski, had served on a jury a couple of weeks ago in front of me in the case of the <a href="People">People</a> versus William Crump.

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Mr. Crump was accused and convicted by that jury of two counts of criminal sexual conduct in the first degree.

The argument was made by Mr. Stephen

Turner's counsel that those individuals' service

on that jury constitutes a basis for excusing them

for cause from this particular jury.

That argument was first advanced when Mr. Kaminski was seated. He was the first of those three individuals I've named to be seated.

At side bar I informed counsel that I did not believe that that was a proper interpretation of the rule, and did not believe that Mr. Kaminski was excusable for cause.

When Miss Bartlett and Mr. Nelson were seated, one side bar conference was had with regard to one of those, and the same issue was raised and similarly decided by the Court.

With regard to the other of those two witnesses, I think I made it clear in the course

of asking if they were challenges for cause other than that, so as to preserve the issue, it being obvious what I was going to do, having ruled that Mr. Kaminski could stay.

Miss Bartlett and Mr. Nelson, it was Mr. Nelson, I believe, were eventually excused peremptorily by defense counsel. Mr. Kaminski remains on the jury.

The challenge for cause is based upon Rule 2.511(D)(7). Obviously, that rule is a civil rule of procedure. However, it is made applicable to criminal cases by Rule 6.412(A).

The argument is made that those jurors have already sat on a trial, as the rule refers to, quote, "of the same issue, period," closed quote.

There are two reasons why this Court does not believe that that rule applies here.

First of all, I do not believe that those jurors sat on a trial of the same issue. I think it is significant that the rule does not say "of the same charge." It says "of the same issue."

Even, however, if it said "of the same charge," it would not be applicable here because

we had two different charges. It's true that the charge in the other case and the charge in this case, at least a couple of them, is criminal sexual conduct in the first degree. But, as everybody knows, there are a variety of forms of criminal sexual conduct in the first degree.

To quantify it for purposes of this ruling, it might be appropriate to refer to them as CSC 1-A, 1-B, 1-C, et cetera. They are in fact all different crimes, simply carrying the same label and carrying the same penalty because they have some common elements, particularly force and coercion, perhaps certainly penetration. However, these are very different charges.

In the other case, the allegations were that an adult woman was sexually penetrated by means of force or coercion, and that physical injury occurred as a consequence.

If that was proven, as it was to that jury, criminal sexual conduct in the first degree occurred.

In this case, it is alleged that sexual penetration took place with a child under the age of 13. While that's criminal sexual conduct in the first degree, it is a much different criminal

sexual conduct in the first degree than the other one. Therefore, we, in reality, do not have the same charge.

Looking in fact at the rule itself, which talks about "the same issue," raises a whole host of questions which, I think by virtue of their existence, demonstrate that it doesn't mean what counsel believes it means as the predicate for her challenge for cause.

When we're talking about "the same issue," do we mean exactly the same charge with exactly the same affirmative defenses and exactly the same challenges to issues with witnesses?

"Issues" are a whole host of things.

If in fact we have two identical cases, identical in terms of charge, identical in terms of response, identical in terms of legal ramifications, then maybe we have two cases involving the same issue.

But I can't say, for the reasons I've already described, that a CSC charge brought by an adult woman claiming the use of force and coercion and the occurrence of an injury is anywhere near the same charge or issue as we're dealing with here, which is a claim of sexual penetration on a

minor child, where there need be no force or coercion and where there need be no aggravating circumstance such as injury.

There's another reason, and that has to do with, simply, a construction of this particular rule.

I've had occasion to deal with it once before in the case of the <u>People</u> versus <u>Joseph</u>

<u>Jones</u>. It was a Lake County case to which I was assigned, the court file was 89-2634-FH, where exactly the same argument was made.

The charge there was not one of CSC, but assault with intent to do great bodily harm less than murder, but we had jurors on one case who had heard a similar charge. I ruled just as I did here.

There was no appeal on that issue.

There was an appeal of the conviction, which was affirmed, but there wasn't an appeal of my ruling, so obviously the Court of Appeals can't have been said to affirm me. But, nevertheless, I can be found consistent in relying on that.

Michigan Rule 2.511(D) is borrowed from the state of Iowa, and the state of Iowa has routinely interpreted its equivalent of (D)(7) as

limited only to situations where a prospective juror has tried the case of a co-defendant of the subsequent defendant in whose case they're potentially to be seated and are challenged for cause.

It's a routine rule of construction that when this state borrows a statute or rule from another jurisdiction, it borrows that statute or rule whole, which means with all of the legal interpretations that go with it.

Accordingly, on the face of it, (D)(7) would apply only to the situation of Mr. Kaminski, for example, having sat on Daniel Turner's case, then being called as a prospective juror in Mr. Stephen Turner's case.

If that's what the rule means, then obviously it doesn't apply here.

It may not mean that, however, by virtue of Subrule (D)(8), which talks about having served as a petit juror, which we talk about in a criminal case based on the same transaction.

So it seems that we have a Rule 8 which means exactly the same thing that Rule 7 means, which can't be, because we have a strict rule of construction which says we don't do useless

things, despite what the public thinks. That we don't have two provisions in a rule or a statute which mean exactly the same thing, because, by definition, then one of them means nothing, and we presume that when things are written we don't do that sort of thing.

That does not, however, resolve the issue, but simply leaves this Court to attempt to find a distinction which would enable both of these sub rules to have some meaning. If it can do that, then it has to do that.

I think, frankly, I've already done that by indicating that "the same issue" doesn't mean "the same charge."

But I think there's another interpretation, and that is that, in all likelihood, (D)(7) applies to civil cases. That (D)(8) was added to deal with the situation, that could be troublesome, of one juror sitting in judgment on a matter where they have already formed a judgment, and that (D)(7) has reference to a juror sitting on a civil case or multiple civil cases arising out of the same transaction.

And if we give it that interpretation, then the use of the word "issue" makes some sense,

because civil cases do not have the similarity that enables us to talk about charges.

You might have an auto negligence case, but there are no two identical auto negligence cases. You can't say that because this was a negligence case it's the same kind of case, as we can if we're talking about a robbery being the same charge as in another case.

So it's my judgment, frankly, that whatever Rule 7 means, it does not simply mean having sat on a case involving the same charge, and that Rule 8 is the one that governs specifically the situation we're dealing with.

It's the one that talks about criminal cases. It requires that the juror have sat on a case arising out of the same transaction. That simply has not happened here.

So looking at the specifically applicable rule, eight doesn't apply, which leads to the conclusion that if seven then applies to this situation, why bother having eight.

The fact is you don't need Sub
Rule 7 -- you don't need Sub Rule 8 if Sub Rule 7
means what defense counsel says it means, and vice
versa.

On the other hand, if seven is limited to civil cases, then we have two sub rules, each of which has its own independent meaning, which means each of which can remain. And we then have an interpretation of Sub Rule 7 which gives some sense to the use of the word "issue" as opposed to the use of the word "charge" or something more narrow, and eliminates the problems that would occur.

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I would also note that there is nothing in my ruling here which suggests that the fact that a juror has in fact served on a like case does not mean that there might be some other reason to disqualify them.

And I'd like to simply read the last paragraph of my opinion in <u>Joseph Jones</u> and then deem this matter finished. Quote:

"Of course, the failure in any case to satisfy Ground (D)(7) does not necessarily mean that some other ground has not been satisfied. For example, a prospective juror's prior service on a case involving the same offenses, but not the same parties or transactions, might have biased that juror, thereby leading to that juror's

disqualification under MCR 2.511(D)(3), might have led to a state of mind or a positive opinion which precludes him or her from rendering a just verdict, rendering them disqualified pursuant to MCR 2.511(D)(4), or engendered an opinion or some conscientious scruples which would improperly influence that juror's verdict, rendering them disqualified under MCR 2.511(D)(5). If so, the juror must be excused for cause."

Nothing of the sort has been demonstrated in this case with regard to the challenged jurors. However, the defense challenge is based exclusively on service in a prior trial. Should one or more of those grounds be established with regard to placement of jurors with prior criminal experience, this Court will, of course, discharge them for cause.

And had one of these other grounds been established I would have discharged the jurors, but not simply because Mr. Kaminski, Mr. Nelson, and Miss Bartlett served on a jury in which the charge was criminal sexual conduct of the first degree.

What's the other matter, Miss Krause,

that we needed to put on the record?

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MS. KRAUSE: There are a few brief other matters, your Honor, thank you.

If I've already addressed this
yesterday, I apologize. You can tell me if I
have. We have been kind of doing the pre-trial
matters piecemeal here. But because the Court has
ruled on the spousal immunity issue and that my
client's wife may not be called to the stand, I
want it made perfectly clear in a pre-trial ruling
that the prosecutor cannot comment on his
exercising the privilege, nor her failure to
testify.

There are a lot of civilian witnesses here and I would like those witnesses to be instructed that such a matter may not -- that they cannot testify to that, either.

THE COURT: I'm sure Mr. Bramble knows to do that.

MS. KRAUSE: Thank you.

The other objection I have, your Honor, is to a preliminary instruction that you gave the jury yesterday in reference to aiding and abetting.

One of the examples you gave

specifically said you were using it as an example because you didn't think it was an issue in this case.

I did not object at the time because I was not sure which version the prosecutor was going to assert in his opening statement. As we heard today, he was saying that the allegations are that my client held Lakeysha down during the commission of the CSC First by his brother.

I want the objection noted on the record. At this point I'm not going to ask for a cautionary instruction because I don't want to highlight it any further.

The next objection I have or cautionary instruction I have is because of the close quarters we're dealing with here with two juries in this courtroom, I ask that the State exercise extreme care in the way the evidence is handled and displayed in front of the jury.

If something has been introduced, obviously, that's fine. But I don't want evidence that is not introduced sitting there in front of the jury on their table for them to see and wonder what it is.

The final issue is what we're going to

do with the prior allegation of abuse reference

Lakeysha Cage. I don't think -- we've already

addressed that issue, in that we've never been

informed what it was, and I think that issue needs

to be dealt with once and for all before we

proceed any further.

If it's relevant to our case, we need to know it now. If it's not, we'll get off the subject and continue on.

THE COURT: The record needs to reflect that at defense counsel's request, I did sign an order shortly before the Thanksgiving holiday directing that counseling records of Miss Cage be turned over to me in camera.

I did that in compliance with <u>People</u> versus <u>Damski</u>. The records were on my desk Monday morning. I did review them. They were easy to review because they were all of three or four pages.

I then did give copies to each counsel, including the prosecutor, because there were, frankly, matters in there which might be of significance to both sides, in particular the defense. Whether they are, of course, is a matter known only to defendants and their counsel, but

One of the reasons that I disclosed the information was a handwritten notation in the notes that there had been an incident of prior sexual abuse of Miss Cage, and we have been trying for the last couple days to find out the particulars of that allegation so that it can be decided whether it represents an exception to the rape shield statute or not.

Mr. Bramble, do you know what are the particulars of that allegation?

MR. BRAMBLE: Yes, your Honor. I spoke with Mr. Marble, the victim's stepfather, this morning. He is present in the courtroom for the Court.

The Court granted the defense's motion over our objection, and Mr. Marble was reluctant to turn over those records because we opposed the production, and I understand his reasons for being reluctant to disclose those records.

He provided me with a real thin sketch of what took place, and I can provide that for the Court.

It was a matter alleging some inappropriate touching by a female cousin who was

a minor at the time. It's my understanding from talking to Mr. Marble that it was a touching of her genital or vaginal area.

The only thing that was ever done was Lakeysha spoke with Mr. Marble, he took the information over to the mother of the female cousin, discussed it with her, and it was never brought to the attention of law enforcement authorities, and that is the extent of it.

THE COURT: How old was the cousin -
MR. BRAMBLE: All I know is the cousin
was a minor.

THE COURT: -- at the time?

MR. BRAMBLE: I don't know if Mr. Marble knows how old she was.

THE COURT: Roughly, are we talking about an eight, nine year old, early teen?

MR. MARBLE: Early teen.

THE COURT: Well, 13, 14, somewhere around there?

MR. MARBLE: Somewhere around there.

THE COURT: Mr. Marble, I am no more interested than are you in having this matter inappropriately disclosed, but if we don't deal with it thoroughly, what I can almost assure you

is that the Court of Appeals will send this matter back if there's a conviction for a second trial, simply because we didn't go into it fully enough under circumstances where had we gone into it, nothing would have been affected.

So I need to know as much as I can with regard to those allegations. The press reporter is not here. It's just the folks involved in this particular case.

So, as best you recall, first of all, how old was the girl cousin at the time this happened?

MR. MARBLE: To be quite honest with you, I'm not sure how old she is today. This was sometime back. She could have been -- she was under 17 years of age.

THE COURT: Is she an adult now? I mean, we ought know, Mr. Marble, whether someone is in the vicinity of 13 or 14 or whether someone is 16 or 17. I can understand not knowing whether someone is 13 or 14, but what range of age?

MR. MARBLE: She's an adult now.

THE COURT: How long ago did this happen?

MR. MARBLE: Maybe a year and a half.

1 THE COURT: Year and a half ago? 2 MR. MARBLE: Yeah. 3 THE COURT: So she's an adult now. She 4 was almost an adult then. 5 MR. MARBLE: I quess you could say that. 6 THE COURT: The matter was never taken 7 to the authorities? 8 MR. MARBLE: The matter was never taken 9 to the authorities. 10 THE COURT: How did you find out about 11 it? Did Lakeysha tell you? 12 MR. MARBLE: Lakeysha told me, and the 13 person was questioned at the time, was seeking 14 counseling for her sexual behavior, and when it 15 was brought to my attention, I felt that the best 16 thing to do was to let her mother know and my wife 17 and I deal with Lakeysha. 18 THE COURT: Was there any allegation by 19 Lakeysha that this cousin had penetrated her 20 genital area or just touched it with her hand? 21 MR. MARBLE: No, just inappropriate 22 touching. 23 THE COURT: What do you mean by 24 "inappropriate touching"?

MR. MARBLE: With her hand.

MR. MARBLE: Well, at the time Lakeysha had slept with her cousin in the same bed, and that morning when Lakeysha explained it to me, it took place that morning. She felt her genital area and threatened that if she told she would physically harm her.

And at the time Lakeysha was not -- this wasn't in our home, this was in her grandmother's home, and she went to tell her grandmother, and at the time that Lakeysha told me, this was, I can't say if it was the same day, but when she told me -- I felt something was wrong with her and I asked her, and when I asked her she emotionally told me what had happened.

THE COURT: Thank you, sir.

Miss Krause, do you want to make some argument on the subject?

MS. KRAUSE: Your Honor, as it was not reported to the authorities, I don't believe it is a situation where we could argue it comes in under a prior false accusation.

At this point in time it does not appear that, according to Mr. Marble, what happened a

year and a half ago is similar enough to what is alleged here or that it is going to rise to any level that would make it acceptable under the rape shield statute.

THE COURT: Mr. Mirque?

MR. MIRQUE: I'm not sure why it would be able to come in, either, your Honor. The only question I have is later on down the road when we're making arguments, the prosecution's going to argue, "How else could it have happened unless it did," and that this is, like, information that only a child would know unless it actually happened, then I'm afraid that it could become relevant.

The question of whether it comes in under the rape shield statute, I have to take a closer look at that statute to see whether it comes in because, quite frankly, this is new information to me. I can't comment on it.

THE COURT: Based upon what I've heard thus far, I don't believe it is admissible. It does not satisfy any of the specific reasons that the rape shield statute says would justify its admission, nor is it similar enough in any regard that it would satisfy the common law exceptions

which the courts have drafted onto the statute in order to satisfy due process requirements.

And I don't even think that it is pertinent in rebuttal to the argument that "how would a child know unless it happened," because there wasn't anything unique about what happened.

If in fact the prior incident had involved a man, an erection and ejaculation, whatever, something that perhaps a child would not know otherwise than having seen it once, the argument that "it must have happened this time because how else would she know about it" would be answered, in part, by having seen it one time earlier.

But having a female cousin simply touch her in the genital area once doesn't provide any kind of an education which I see in the least bit pertinent in this particular case, and to admit it for that reason would be to stretch the rape shield statute to the point of breaking it and clearly violate its objective.

Obviously, things can change as proofs develop, and this evidence might become relevant depending upon how things develop. It's not a prediction that it will, simply a reservation of

MS. KRAUSE: Thank you, your Honor.

MR. MIRQUE: Thank you, your Honor.

THE COURT: Mr. Bramble, would you please get Miss Cage up here so that when I get the juries in here we can get started, rather than sit and wait, and as soon as she's here let me know and I'll get the juries in.

So as long as they keep it as proposed right behind counsel table, we've done more than what would normally happen in a typical trial to obscure their view of evidence not yet received.

I think that's perfectly adequate.

THE COURT: I'd like to see counsel at the bench. While they're assembling, ladies and gentlemen, let me explain a little something to you.

We've heard talk this afternoon about a thing called a preliminary examination. You might be interested knowing what that is.

It's a court proceeding, although it probably isn't appropriate to call it a hearing of any sort, because there aren't any decisions made.

Whenever a charge is serious enough, a criminal charge to be tried in this court, soon after the charges are brought the witnesses are brought together, the people accused and the lawyers are brought together in a courtroom, and the people who have something to say, in shortened version, do it so that everybody has an idea what the case is about, so that this proceeding is not the first time that people are hearing things.

It helps prepare cases if you have some idea what people are going to say.

In this case, that preliminary examination took place on the 20th of July. It's

done in a courtroom. The witnesses testify under oath. What they say is recorded. There's a judge presiding over the proceedings to keep order, but there isn't any jury and there isn't any decision made as to guilt or innocence. It's simply an opportunity for everybody to get educated for the value that that has.

But, as I say, everything which is said is recorded and it's common practice to make reference to it during a trial, as has been made hear this afternoon.

May I see counsel up here now?

(Counsel approached the bench, and a discussion was held off the record and out of the hearing of the jury)

THE COURT: Ladies and gentlemen, obviously everybody needs a break about now, so we're going to take one. We have to switch juries and I think, frankly, the bulk of the afternoon is likely to be spent with the other jury, so there's no point in asking you to hang around. So for you, the day is finished.

We're going to do the extraordinary thing, because I understand everybody is available, of coming back tomorrow. We normally

don't have trials on Friday afternoon. Obviously, this two-jury arrangement prolongs things to some extent, although once we get beyond some of these witnesses, it will move a lot faster. But I think we'll catch up a fair amount if we work tomorrow afternoon.

Please be careful, for all the reasons
I've talked before, about any exposure to news
coverage of this, if in fact there is something in
today's paper, I assume there is, but I don't
know.

Also, please don't talk about it, don't come to any conclusions, and simply be back in your jury room 1:30 tomorrow afternoon and we'll work until about four or 4:30, but no later, and then break for the evening.

(At about 3:15 p.m. - Recess taken)

(At about 3:36 p.m. - Court back in session, in the presence of the Stephen Turner jury)

Whenever a charge is brought that's serious enough to be tried in this court, and there are a lot of charges that qualify in that regard, a preliminary examination is held soon after the charges are brought.

I looked in the file in this case, and the hearing in this case was held on the 20th of July. It's not a trial. There is no jury. There's nobody who decides whether somebody is guilty or innocent, or even may be guilty or innocent.

It's simply an opportunity for the parties, meaning the lawyers and the individuals accused of the crime, to see some of the witnesses and get a preliminary statement as to what the witnesses will say.

That hearing is held in front of a judge in this building. It's held in front of a judge in a court, but it's held in this building, and the judge presides, like I am, to keep order.

There is no jury. There are no findings of fact. It's simply an opportunity to discover what's going on.

The witnesses are under oath, just as they are here. The matter is recorded just as it is here, and a transcript is always prepared so that the parties have it for preparation, and it's fairly common to use it, as it is now being used, to demonstrate things were said then that might be different than now to help people refresh their recollections and to do things of that sort.

But I don't want you to think that there's been some kind of a previous proceeding where somebody made some kind of decision of guilt or innocence. There has not been. That's for you, and you will be doing it for the first
